



## CERES GLOBAL AG REPORTS FINANCIAL RESULTS FOR Q2 FY2020

**Minneapolis, MN (February 12, 2020)** – Ceres Global Ag Corp. (TSX: CRP) (“Ceres” or the “Corporation”) today announced its financial and operating results for the quarter ended December 31, 2019. All amounts are in U.S. currency unless otherwise noted.

### CEO Commentary

“Q2 2020 marked Ceres’ best quarterly financial results thus far, demonstrating continued progress in effecting our strategy and the ability to thrive in a difficult environment,” said Robert Day, President and Chief Executive Officer of Ceres. “In addition to its strong financial performance, the Corporation continues to make progress on growth-related initiatives that will strengthen its position in the market long-term.”

“While market conditions remain challenging across the broader industry, efforts made over the past several years around developing customer solutions, adding talent to the organization and improving processes have prepared us to succeed in this type of environment,” Mr. Day continued. “This is allowing Ceres to consistently deliver on our customers’ needs and be true to our vision to be the most trusted and valued partner with quality-conscious customers.”

### Financial and Operational Highlights for the quarter ended December 31, 2019

- Net income for the quarter was \$2.3 million, compared to a loss of \$5.2 million for the quarter ended December 31, 2018.
- Gross profit for the quarter increased by \$6.2 million compared to the quarter ended December 31, 2018, resulting from solid positioning and increased export volumes.
- EBITDA increased by \$6.9 million compared to the quarter ended December 31, 2018 and is \$10.1 million through the first two quarters of the fiscal year.

### Outlook

Mr. Day continued, “While we expect our strategy to continue yielding positive results, we anticipate a slower Q3 as the Great Lakes and North Mississippi River logistics gateways are closed until spring.”

“Meanwhile, we remain committed to our growth and to adding complementary farmer grain origination assets to our network that will allow us to more competitively originate products directly from farmers,” Mr. Day added. “In addition, we are focused on increasing efficiency and adding capacity to recent acquisitions.”

In calculating EBITDA, Ceres excludes gains and losses on property, plant and equipment, assets held for sale, and gains and losses on equity investments as these items are considered to be non-reoccurring in nature. Ceres may calculate EBITDA differently than other companies; therefore, Ceres’ EBITDA may not be comparable to similar measures presented by other issuers.
